The Human and Civil Rights Association of New Jersey was first established in 1973 as a means of coordinating activities among municipal, State and Federal Human and Civil Rights Agencies. It has since grown to include over eighty groups from both the public and private sectors involved in the elimination and prevention of discrimination. Formal and informal programs are conducted to eradicate bias based on race, creed, color, national origin, ancestry, age, sex, marital status or physical or mental handicap. The **Association** became incorporated in May of 1975.

Each November, the **Association** is involved in the League of Municipalities convention in Atlantic City. A workshop is conducted which concentrates on an area of human and civil rights of particular interest to municipal officials. An information booth provides data from member agencies to convention participants for the entire week.
